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APRIL IS THE BIRTHDAY OF THE SOCIETY

Forty-two years ago on April 27, 1963 the very first meeting of a group of people interested in saving the Pioneer Church took place at the home of Katharine and Kelly Johnson. That was the very beginning of our Chatsworth Historical Society and we have come a long way!

We sat around the Johnson's living room and talked about saving the church building and other artifacts and pictures. We decided that night to write to the newly formed Cultural Heritage board and ask that the building be saved. Within a week or two the Cultural Heritage Board acted and named the church building Los Angeles Cultural Historic Monument Number 14. The Times came out and took a picture of Sheila Watts and me (Virginia) and we were on our way.

We were all so thrilled and feeling powerful but unaware of the problems we still had to face. At the next meeting in a schoolroom we voted Charles Janess in as president and Lila Schepler as vice president. Within a couple of months Mr. Janess had a heart attack and Lila finished out his term. In spite of a lot of problems, including finding out that the church had to be moved and finding a place to put it, we have survived.

Not only did we complete the project of moving the church we refurbished it and it is now a well-known historic site, used every Sunday as a house of worship. And, in addition, we have saved and refurbished the Hill-Palmer Bungalow and gardens and established a museum complete with exhibits, tours and a collection and maintained it for more than 26 years. And thanks to our executive board members and our hard-working presidential team of Linda and Andre van der valk plus our busy Bea Berman as fund raiser, we have money in the bank and a loyal treasurer to pay our bills.

I would say that we are a pretty good group of historical buffs. Thanks to everyone who has helped us over the years.

GRACE HAYES LODGE

This Studio City restaurant in the 1940's at 11345 Ventura Blvd., was known for its informality and the possibility that Hollywood celebrities would put on impromptu acts.

GRAND CENTRAL AIR TERMINAL

Located near the Los Angeles River in Glendale, Grand Central was the region's most glamorous passenger airport in the 1930s. Charles Lindbergh flew the first transcontinental airline flight from there on July 8, 1929, and pre-flight parties for departing Hollywood celebrities were a common sight. In World War II, Grand Central became a training base. After the field closed in 1959 the acreage was developed as an industrial park. Still standing, however, is the Spanish Colonial Revival terminal building and control tower designed by Henry L. Gogerty. Now owned by Disney, it can be seen at 1310 Airway Drive.

HANSEN DAM SWIMMING BEACH

After World War II, the reservoir behind Hansen Dam was allowed to fill and a sand beach was installed. Boating was also welcome at the small lake. It gradually filled with silt from Tujunga Wash and the lake and beach were discontinued

HANSEN HEIGHTS

Dr. Homer Hansen founded this community in the Verdugo Mountains. What remains is Shadow Hills. Some of the settlement, including Hansen's estate, was claimed by the construction of the Hansen Dam.

HELIPORT

Commercial copter flights to LAX ran for a time in 1959 to help commuters get around traffic snarls. Flights on Los Angeles Airway left from a terminal at Sepulveda Blvd. and Otsego St. In 1965, flights resumed briefly from Van Nuys Airport.

HELMS BAKERY TRUCKS

Helms trucks roamed the neighborhoods of suburbia in the 1950s and 1960s tooting a distinctive whistle and dispensing fresh bread and pastries out of drawers in the back. Many a valley native remembers the just-baked aroma of the Helms truck and the sight of the doughnut drawer sliding open to reveal neat rows of crullers and glaze twists.

HEWITT'S HATCHERY

Large chicken breeding farm --advertised as "A Valley Hatchery for Valley Folks" was at 13833 Oxnard St. in Van Nuys.

HOLLY HEIGHTS POLO AND HUNT CLUB

Private country club with two polo fields and stables for 200 horses was at Ventura Blvd. and Fulton Ave. in the 1920s and 30s.

HOLLYWOOD COUNTRY CLUB

Large club with stables was on the mountains side of Ventura Blvd. straddling where Coldwater Canyon now heads south

HOLLYWOOD STUDIO ZOO

This small attraction where visitors could gawk at animals from the movies was at 15445 Ventura Blvd. during the 1920s and 30s.

HUNTSINGER TURKEY RANCH

From 1945 until moving to Bouquet Canyon in 1952, under pressure from the growing suburbs, the large turkey ranch was off of Lassen St. west of Reseda Blvd. in Northridge.
