Everything is coming together at the Homestead Acre. The Rec. and Park Dept. has started the work on the foundation and pretty soon we will be ready to paint the cottage. We have been advised that we may have to pay for the painting of the cottage ourselves due to the city budget restraints. They also will be fixing the time capsule that was damaged by vandalism a few years back. The cottage will get new screens and then hopefully we will be done.

The last couple of years the Acre has seen some major improvements which our budget would never have been able to pay for. The sprinklers and the lead abatement would have been well over \$100,000 for those two projects. We are very thankful to the Rec. and Park Dept. and Councilman Greig Smith for helping us preserve our historical landmark. The new display cases cost approx. \$5,800.00, which the Chatsworth Neighborhood Council paid for. We are fortunate that people recognize how important the Acre is to the community.

I hope everyone comes to see us and our new improvements at Membership Round-Up on Sept. 10th. (the paint will not be done by then). We are also going to have some special guests who we will thank for helping us with our renovations.

# Museum News By Virginia Watson, Curator

Wednesday-at-the-Acre has proven to be a valuable innovation for the Society with many hours of volunteer time used up in every day practices. A docent is a teacher who helps tell the story of the museum either as a tour guide or contributes to the history of the monument by helping the curator with her duties. Docents also distribute flyers and information to visitors, and help make displays or assist in caring for artifacts and furniture or collections. They help with the Smoke Signal (folding, taping, attaching address labels and stamps) and other clerical and housekeeping duties for the museum and the cottage. They also help with festivals and money-making projects, input data into our computer, work in the library and help with the costume collection. We also have garden docents who especially help with the deadheading, weeding and planting. They work closely with the Garden Directors Jim and Betty Summers.

At the present time there are 15 docents. Workers meet every Wednesday from 9 a.m. until noon. But not all of them come every week. Some come only occasionally and help out as needed.

All of the docents are trained in the history of the Hill family, other Pioneer families and Chatsworth or North Valley history and can give guided tours usually after they have been coming four or five weeks.

# **DATES IN VALLEY HISTORY**

#### SEPT. 5, 1876

Golden spike driven at Lang Station on the far side of the Newhall Pass opens the Southern Pacific railroad north from San Fernando. Train travel between the Valley and Northern California becomes possible.

#### SEPT. 5, 1975

Lynette (Squeaky) Fromme, a follower of Charles Manson who had lived at Spahn Ranch in Chatsworth, tries to shoot President Gerald Ford.

#### SEPT. 8, 1797

Founding Mass held at Mission San Fernando, Rey de Espana.

#### SEPT. 12, 1949

First Valley College classes are held in temporary quarters at Van Nuys High.

#### SEPT. 15, 1874

State Senator Charles Maclay files a plot map for San Fernando, the first town founded in the Valley.

#### SEPT. 16, 1959

Nikita Khrushchev, leader of the Soviet Union, visits the Valley at the height of the Cold War tension.

#### SEPT. 18, 1962

First flight of the Pregnant Guppy airplane, at Van Nuys Airport.

#### SEPT. 20, 1889

Miguel Leonis, notorious Calabasas rancher and troublemaker, dies in a fall from his wagon in Cahuenga Pass.

#### SEPT. 24, 1909

A syndicated of investors led by Los Angeles Times owner Harrison Gray Otis pays 2.5 million for 47,500 acres that used to belong to the Lankershim family ranching empire.

#### SEPT. 24, 1956

First classes held at San Fernando Valley State College, later CSUN.

#### SEPT. 27, 1930

Sepulveda Boulevard tunnel under Mulholland Highway completed.

#### SEPT. 27, 1942

Motion Picture Home dedicated at Calabasas.
