On January 31, 2025, Brother John Crowe passed away. For decades, Brother John dedicated his life to the mission of Rancho San Antonio, tirelessly advocating for the young men who called Rancho home. Brother John was named Citizen of the Year by the Chatsworth Community Coordinating Council in 1994. He was honored for his work at Rancho San Antonio. I remember that he did not attend because he was on a fishing trip. I believe he enjoyed fishing. When we first moved to Chatsworth, Rancho owned the whole corner of DeSoto and Plummer. The Historical Society just received a postcard that shows the boys on horses with 18 head of livestock. There were 12 acres of alfalfa harvested 6 times yearly by the boys. There will be a Catholic Mass March 1 at St John Eudes at 2:30pm, followed by a reception at the dining hall at Rancho San Antonio.

We are looking forward to our vintage fashion show that Ann and her crew are working hard on, to make it another great event. It will be held on April 27th from 12:30pm to 3:00pm. Ann has been working hard on our hat collection which seems to number close to 100. Who knew we had that many hats? Again, this year we are limiting attendance to 75 people so get those reservations in soon.

Celebrating the Life of Elaine Campbell

(1922-2025)

Elaine Campbell passed away on January 15th, she was 103 years old.

Elaine enjoyed taking photos of Chatsworth. She always had her camera ready, and when the 1994 Northridge earthquake hit, she took to the streets photographing buildings. She provided a write-up of her experiences that day and created a photo album of the community to document the event.


It wasn't a surprise that after one of her walking and photography adventures she talked to Buck at the Munch Box, who suggested she get involved with the Chatsworth Historical Society. She was welcomed

with open arms and found a large box of loose photos that Virgina Watson suggested could be put in notebooks, (which was exactly the type of project that Elaine enjoyed), so her project started. The photos needed to be sorted, people identified and listed in the books and the project has would be mostly completed... until a new stack of photos would be discovered. Over 20 years Elaine created 50 notebooks filled with photos of events and activities, articles, obituaries and more, documenting the Chatsworth Historical Society. Once the Historical Society had a scanner, she volunteered to scan each notebook one by one to make sure all the photos and their history was preserved.

Elaine also shared her Movie Star photo collection with us for our displays. As a teenager, Elaine had filled out the advertisement in the movie fan magazines where you could ask for a photo of the featured star. An autographed copy would be sent to you. They would all be framed and hung on her walls, at least until the 1994 earthquake. She has photographs that say "To Elaine" from stars such as Bette Davis, Bing Crosby, Cary Grant, Humphrey Bogart, Laurel & Hardy, Loretta Young and Tyrone Power...to name a few.

She worked at every Historical Society event, rode in the Chatsworth parades, participated in field trips and served as a docent for many years sharing the history of our community.

After joining the Historical Society in 1999, she joined the Chatsworth Womens Club in 2000 and became actively involved. She first took on Literature




By 2006, Elaine was selected Citizen of the Year for her work in our community with both the Historical

Roy Rogers "This is your Life"

We had fun on January 21st with our presentation featuring Roy Rogers. As time goes by, we realize that our current and future members may not know this history that was such an active part of our lives in Chatsworth. Some things are worth sharing over and over so they are not forgotten.

This Presentation provided a brief history of the Roy Rogers family, focusing on their contributions to Chatsworth. At the end, we concluded with a 26-minute video of the 1953 television episode <u>"This is Your Life" honoring Roy Rogers</u>. It is a touching moment showcasing the sincere and humble Roy Rogers that many of us knew, when he later lived in Chatsworth from 1955 to 1965.

Did you know:



Roy Rogers' career began in 1934 with a recording contract with the Sons of the Pioneers. Roy soon



turned to movies, and was in the top-ten money-making western stars list from 1939 to 1954. He and his wife Dale Evans also appeared on the Roy Rogers Radio Show for nine years, before moving to television from 1951 through 1957. Roy Rogers was inducted into the Hollywood Walk of fame in 1960. He has four stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame, in recognition of his achievements in

radio, music (with the Sons of the Pioneers), film, and television.

In 1955, Roy Rogers purchased the 129-acre Swan Paulson Homestead in Chatsworth on Andora from Max Schonfeld, General Manager of Devonshire Downs, and renamed it the Double R Bar Ranch. The ranch had a small house on it built in 1938, that was expanded to 6,000 square feet and still exists today. In a 1987 quote Dusty Rogers said, "We moved from the Hollywood Hills to Encino, then to a ranch in

Chatsworth. We always moved away from the encroaching population because Dad liked his privacy. He wanted his kids raised on a ranch, where they could have horses and pigs and chickens and cows."

Episodes of The Roy Rogers Show on NBC TV featured the Double R Bar Ranch in Chatsworth.

In 1964, they sold most of the ranch to a subdivider, and in 1965, Roy and Dale sold the remainder and moved to Apple Valley, Ca. near Victorville.

When Roy, Dale and family moved to Chatsworth in 1955 they were very active in the community.



They were co-honorary mayors of Chatsworth during that time. And their children went to Chatsworth Park Elementary School.

Dale played the piano for Sunday School at the Pioneer Church and Roy was a member of the Rotary Club.



Roy was also involved in the Aqua Sierra Sportsmans Club, a skeet and trap shooting range on the Hill Homestead property at the end of Devonshire that began in 1949. In 1956, the Hill homestead was purchased by Henry Berkenkamp of Oroweat Bakeries. By 1959, there were five skeet and trap stations, a 90 foot hitower, one nine-hole golf course, a driving range, and two trout lakes. In 1959 it was advertised as the Roy Rogers Sports Center. Roy did an advertisement for Chevrolet that featured the Sports Center and shooting skeet with his sons. <u>You can</u> watch it here.

The center was closed in 1968/69 as Rockpointe was

developed.

In 1973 the City of Los Angeles purchased the 75-acre skeet/fishing/golf course site and it became today's Chatsworth Park South.

In April 1964, a promotional photo was taken to announce Roy Rogers Rancho Estates. In August 1964, their 12-year-old daughter Debbie died in a tragic church bus accident. In 1965, Roy and Dale moved to Apple Valley.

In 1964, 55 units were approved on 33 acres. The first homes appeared in 1964, and new homes were built over the next 25 years.


In 1969, Eugene Kilmer purchased the undeveloped 96 acres and moved into the Roy Rogers house on Trigger Street. His son Val Kilmer became a well-known movie actor.

Val Kilmer was a drama student at Chatsworth High School with Kevin Spacey in the late 1970's.

Kevin Spacey's film production company is named "Trigger Street Productions"



The remaining 91 acres of the ranch is under development in 2025 as Hidden Oaks by Toll Brothers, with 33 additional homes, and 62 acres as an open space conservation easement.



In 1967, The Roy Rogers' Museum opened across the street from Roy Rogers' Apple Valley Inn.

In 1976 it relocated within California to Victorville, where it stayed for 27 years.

After Roy's death in 1998, and Dale's in 2001, in 2003 the museum moved to Branson, Missouri. The museum struggled financially during an economic downturn, and the remaining family decided to close its doors on December 12, 2009. The majority of the collection was sold at auction in July 2010 for \$2.9 million.


Rogers' 1963 Pontiac Bonneville sold for the price of \$254,500. Artist Nudie Cohn, Rogers' tailor, outfitted the car with silver dollars on the dashboard, chrome-plated pistols, horseshoes, miniature horses and rifles, many of which were functional parts of the car such as door handles, switches and controls.



Historic Land Patents of the Santa Monica Mountains

Gary & Nita Standke recently observed this map at the Adamson House visitors center. It identifies early Spanish and Mexican land grants or "ranchos", that were respected in the 1848 Mexican-American War treaty of Guadalupe-Hidalgo. (California became a state in 1850).


When the ranchos were patented, the land left over became "Public Lands", available to Homesteaders. We made a few calls, and <u>the 2010 Original U.S. Land Patents map</u> was shared with us by the National Park Service.



This is an amazing resource tool.

The Homestead Act parcels (shown in purple), enacted during the Civil War in 1862, provided that any adult citizen, or intended citizen, who had never borne arms against the U.S. government could claim 160 acres of surveyed government land. Claimants were required to live on and "improve" their plot by cultivating the land. Property acquired by the Cash Act are shown in green.
