Their common interests among all the members of this household were literary in scope, affording tremendous help to one another as critics in creating and reading poetry and in the writing of their many books. Their home is a writer's haven, secluded in a wooded glen, suggesting complete isolation from outside activities.

Miss Benson told me that he held his office as Chatsworth's Hongary Mayor in highest esteem and considered it a great privilege to have been asked to perform this service.

And so we say "Adieu" to one who gave of his talents that others may have enjoyment.

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
