ARROW-RED TRANSPORTATION CO.

We have another newcomer as far as name is concerned, yet the site has been used by Mr. Fraker for the last two years for his operations in the hay business. Remember the fire they had about a year ago? I didn't talk with Mr. Fraker, President of Arrow-Red at 10027 Canoga, but with Bill Hunt who is considering a co-partnership.

They operate six heavy-duty equipment which represent an investment of \$27,000 to \$30,000 each, for heavy hauling of lumber, steel, and the like. The grounds are immaculate.

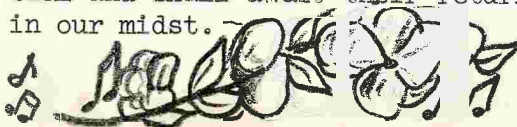
