FLAG DAY-JUNE 14th

On July 4, 1776 Congress accepted the Declaration of Independence and on June 14th, a year later, this resolution was adopted: "That the Flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the Union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field representing a new constellation."

Decades later, 1916 to be exact, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed June 14th as Flag Day. The stripes of the flag represent the thirteen original states; the stars record the growth of the nation. With the addition in 1912 of New Mexico and Arizona, the stars in the flag reached 48, the number we have today. To this flag, over 130,000,000 Americans now pledge allegiance.

The flag is a symbol of our national unity; it tells of the

struggle for independence, of union preserved, the sacrifices of human blood. It means America first; CHATSWORTH has many boys who are doing their part in solidifying our freedom and we know the lonely hours they spend away from home and loved ones. There is One who is always at your side; talk your burdens over with Him and He will give you strength and courage.
