# NATIVE SON PASSES FROM OUR MIDST by Katharine Johnson

Graveside services for our beloved Cecil Graves were held Wednesday, June 22nd, at Oakwood Cemetery, with Dr. Harold Hayward officiating.

Cecil passed away at his home early Sunday morning of the 19th after six months of failing health. He was born in Chatsworth on June 17, 1901, and passed his 54th birthday just two days before his death. He was the son of Fred and Emma Graves of 22000 Chatsworth Street, his mother being the first white child born in San Fernando Valley and who is still a familiar figure on horseback.

Cecil was stricken with polio at the age of 9 and was the first recorded case in the County of Los Angeles. His illness confined him to a wheelchair physically, but he had an indomitable spirit. He attended grammar school here where he graduated from the 8th grade and had one year of high school under a special tutor.

When small, with the help of brothers and sisters, he raised His versatility also included jewelry and watch repairing, bookkeeping and income tax consultant. He also tutored many youngsters with their school work.

He was always interested in scouting and served as Scoutmaster at one time; he was an active member of the Epworth League of the Community Church in his youth. Always an avid sports fan, he was manager of the Chatsworth hardball team several years ago and never missed a game, constantly encour-

aging the players to do their best.

About 20 years ago he attended the Noah Beery Institute on Ventura Blvd. and after a long period of treatments, he was able, with the assistance of braces, specially prepared shoes, and crutches to walk approximately 90 feet. For this accomplishment the Institute was given a citation for meritous service inasmuch as his limbs had not been in use for 26 years. However, these exercises were not continued as he wished to spare his parents this added burden.

Several years ago he received a license to drive an especially equipped car and took on contract farming. Raising hay was, at one time, his chief business and most of the boys in the community came under his kindly influence as they worked for him on the hay bailer. In latter years, he has been associated in varied farming with Ralph Roatcap of Lassen Street.

In spite of his handicap, he enjoyed excellent health, doubtless due to this vigorous outdoor life. He has left an imprint on the lives rabbits and goats, and later cattle.of many that time will never erase. He was one who rightly could have always expectantly received, but instead always gave, generously and kindly, in material things and in service.

> Besides his parents, he leaves a sister, Mrs. Anne (Queenie) Billings of Chatsworth, 3 brothers -Jesse of Redding, Curtis of Buttonwillow, Warren of Santa Susana Knolls, and a host of relatives and friends.

LOU-ANN, kid mascot of LAURELWOOD ACRES, 9325 Topanga Canyon Blvd. says: "Visitors are always welcome at the finest goat farm that has been developed in the United States, and it's right here in Chatsworth. Come over and see me some time."

I aurelwood Acres started in our midst in 1946 and the first wholesale bulk order was shipped on December 15th; their first bottling orders totalled 60 qts. a month today they sell around 25,000 qts. a month to cow dairies for home deliveries.

Laurelwood Acres comprises 125 acres and it was started with a herd of 45 animals and in ten years has grown to 700, raising 100 kids a year for replacements and they have developed their stock to be 100% purebred, consequently there is a great demand for their animals all over the United States. They are exhibited at many state and county fairs and for the past three years have taken best-of-breed in Alpines, Saanens and Toggenburgs, and this past year Nubians at the Arizona State Fair in Phoenix. Their herd has the distinction of getting all Advance Registry Tests under the supervision of University of California which gives their animals production record pedigrees as well as family tree pedigrees. This year Laurelwood was awarded "Dairy of Merit" and is the only goat dairy in

the United States so honored.

The goats are bred once a year and it takes 5 months to have a kid; they give milk 10 months out of 12. being dry 2 months. The goat is a seasonal breeder, the same as sheep, and their breeding season is from September through February, but in their 10 years of very careful observation and selection of animals, they are gradually whipping this obstacle in order to obtain fall fresheners as well as spring fresheners; now are able to breed some in June and July to be fresh in November. Goat milk is over a million dollar industry in Los Angeles.

The goats are milked at 13 mos.; 300 are milked twice a day, 3:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m., 40 at a time and it takes 4 hours each milking time, done by hand. They have a fine milking and processing plant on the grounds; bottles are washed in a separate machine and sterilized in the operation of filling and capping. Goat milk sells for 40¢ a qt. at the farm, or 45¢ delivered.

Laurelwood opens their grounds once a year to specialty shows; the first Sunday in June the San Fernando Valley Buck Specialty has their show; on the second Sunday, the Alpine Breeders Club of Calif.; the third Sunday the Saanen Dairy Goat Club of Calif.; and last Sunday the Nubian Breeders Assn. Specialty.

Lou-Ann, their mascot, has made numerous personal appearance tours and was on television for three months, and says: "Does your baby keep you awake at night? Is your husband irritable? Do you have asthma? Try Goat's Milk. Be seeing YOU."

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
