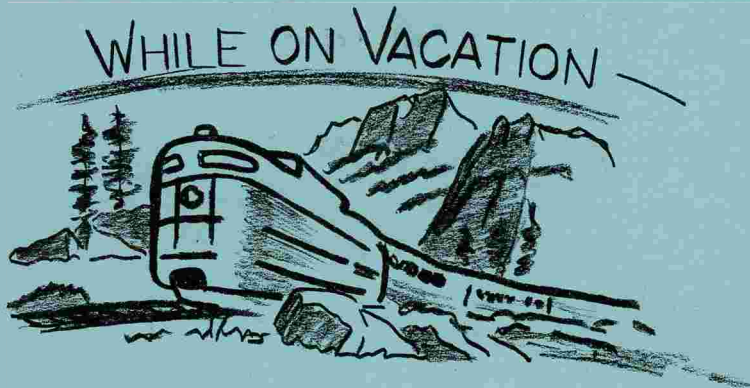

SIDON, LEBANON, July 16th

Perhaps many of us will never get to Lebanon so while one of our hometown boys made it, we would like to share certain parts of his letter with you. From Lloyd Fellows Jr., 10701 Owensmouth Avenue:

"The group of 22 of us from all parts of the world finally assembled here last week at Girard Institute and began clearing the land on which a Presbyterian Church is to be built; an acre of lemon grove purchased from its Moslem owner, whose trees have been planted so close together that very little light penetrates through to the ground; this because of the intense Mediterranean sun and shortage of good land; which is making our job rather difficult.

'We arise at 4:30 a.m. and work until noon and then rest or swim; the Mediterranean is magnificent-beauty beyond words. Late in the afternoon we travel to nearby communities and paint, plaster or repair schools, churches or community buildings. In the evening we participate in discussion groups-exchanging information about our various countries and generally trying to clarify, in our own minds, the reasons for world strife. It is becoming quite clear to me that at the heart of the very fearful world situation lies a great deal of misunderstanding. The World Council of Churches, by bringing people of all countries together, seeks to use the method of working together on a common project to provide the groundwork for greater understanding among people and unity in world Christianity.

'Lebanon is the most richly blest country in the near east materially; their standard of living is generally quite good. The cities are modern, for the most part fairly clean-on a par with French or Italian cities; the people friendly. To get to Lebanon I travelled from Genoa, Italy, on a small steamer to Athens where I had time to see the various Greek and Roman ruins. One feels somewhat insignificant in the course of history when standing on the ruins of a temple dating from 1000 B.C. The heights of culture achieved by these early people, never grasped in my studies at school, is still unbelievable even when standing in the shadow of the Parthenon. It was strange, indeed, for this small town lad to stand on the spot where Paul had stood preaching to the Greeks.

'Sailing on, our ship docked at Alexandria where I was able to see the lavishness of the Palace and grounds of ex-King Farouk. We docked again at Port Said, the mouth of the Suez Canal. Parts of Port Said and Alexandria show the tremendous strides that Egypt has made in the past few years under their new and honest government. They have been ruled long by foreign governments and greedy kings, and the standard of living in their depleted land has been extremely low. I have found many friends among the Egyptians and one cannot fail to see the new enthusiasm they feel for the future of their country. They point with pride to the many new and beautiful buildings, they speak of the increased standard of living made possible to all the people because of road building

and large dams in progress. Perhaps the older people trained by years of poverty, see nothing of tomorrow- they sit in the tea houses and rest. The young people believe in and are working hard for the future of Egypt.

(Lloyd speaks of going on many guided tours, interesting but too lengthy to report).

'Excavations for new buildings at Girard Institute reveal the grounds to be the burial place of many dignitaries of the Phoenecian Period-dating from the pre-Christian era. Directly beneath my window are five large stone burial coffins. The valuable objects of gold, jewels, etc. buried with Kings were removed to the museum at Beirut. The Phoenecian Sea Castle which juts out into the Mediterranean, rebuilt by the Romans and later the Crusaders, is one mile from here. This whole area reeks with history. In digging the church foundation I have found some small pieces of urns; one piece of a "Avgili" (a water smoking pipe) dates only from the 10th century. Today while digging we found a Roman Era coin and much broken pottery which we cannot date. Our hopes are high for finding something really significant.

'On Sunday, I had the pleasure of preaching in the Protestant Church in Sidon. It was conducted in Arabic; my words were translated into Arabic, as only half the congregation knew any English, by the minister. Following the service I had dinner with the church elder. It is a wonderful experience to become acquainted with these people. They seem to eat constantly; soft drinks, tea or Turkish coffee, thick and sweet, is a constant thing. They feel that the more the guest eats and drinks, the more friendship he is showing toward the host.

'When the project ends about August 1st, I go to Damascus, then on to Jerusalem where I will spend a few days of study at the American School of Oriental Research. Through them I hope to be aided in seeing the Holy Land-especially the area where the Dead Sea scrolls were found and excavations are in progress.' Thank you Lloyd, for the wonderful letter!!

A couple of Sundays ago, Herman (Dutch) Ackerman, who lived here over fifty years ago, was in town hunting up some of the old timers. He is a nephew of Mrs. Minnie Palmer and now lives in Los Angeles. Mr. Ackerman is a former boxer and was known in the ring as "Sailor" Ackerman and names Jack Dempsey and other famous boxers among his personal friends.

BEEF from TEXAS to GUAYMAS de Mexico taken aboard for CHILE's copper mines and nitrate fields! CANNED GOODS and all that stuff to BALBOA for the many Americans in the Canal Zone. BUENAVENTURA, Colombia, truly an international port with ships from all over the world. We had everything for that port, but especially rubber from Hongkong and paper from Canada. At CALI, Colombia, cement bags, etc. are made of this paper and imported to the USA. The trip to the JUNGLE was the outstanding event in Colombia; I was enchanted with it. Five days in CALLAO and LIMA, PERU, the "City of Kings". That is a city to see! ARICA, CHILE, THE FREE PORT, and a mecca for many Chileans who desire American things--and who does not?
