OUR "ANNUAL!" CH ATSWORTH FIRES

The way we break out in fires every year about this time is a terrific concern of the Los Angeles Fire Department. Inspector Zitko was in our office the other day and asked permission to submit the following article, which we are glad to convey to you.

' Just a year ago this month the usually serene atmosphere of Chatsworth was suddenly pierced and rented with the most urgent protest the fire sirens had made in a long time, for on that Saturday, Sept. 24th, FIRE hurdled a crest just north of town and ravaged its way down the slope to devour acres of valuable watershed and at least half a dozen homes in our community.

' To some (whose homes were not involved) "These things do happen" was all the lesson they could derive. Yet the origin could be traced to the carelessness of ONE person burning rubbish illegally.

' We have a special responsibility when it comes to preventing fires. for fires in these hills not only mar their quiet beauty but destroys the sturdy brush which prevents the soil from washing away during the heavy winter rains. The months of September and October are two of the most dangerous months for brush and mountain fires. John Alderson, Chief of the L.A.F.D. further states that strict adherence to the burning regulations and a general cleanup effort around our homes and yards will do a lot toward preventing a repetition of last year's costly fire.

Perhaps the first step in safeguarding our corner of the San Fernando Valley from fire is a sort of renewal of the moral acceptance of responsibility so beautifully expressed in the following poem, written by Miss Peggy Lee, a popular entertainer who experienced a large brush fire near her home a year ago.

Big green mountain
Rest...your wounded breast.
Time will heal..and you will feel
Again the tender green....
the young...the new.

We..who circle to your top Will try to remember The careless ember The spark That left you so.

And spring will come
To green away the blackened grass
You will see..young grass will
Grow....The scar won't show.

Rest..Big green mountain Without that look of shame. We..not you..are to blame.

'On August 19th and 22nd, 54 rookie firemen were subjected to intensive training in firefighting problems dealing with brush fires; first a film, then a tour of burned area; basic hose evolutions used in brush fires plus tricks which only seasoned mountain firefighters can show them; instruction in proper use of brush-hooks and other brush fire tools; then a drill using $2\frac{1}{2}$ " heavy streams which will test their strengt and skill with the Fire Dept.'s heaviest hand lines on rough terrain.
