CONSTITUTION WEEK

This event was grandiosely recognized by the Santa Susanna Chapter of the D.A.R. at an impressive ceremony held on Monday, September 19th at Chatsworth Center. Flags, flowers from Chatsworth Florists, and a beautifully set refreshment table greeted the eye as a goodly representation from various organizations within our community, and individuals, gathered together to hear the message from the Hon. Edgar W. Hiestand, California's representative to Congress.

Mrs. Minnie Lanahan, Regent, opened the meeting by having the colors advanced by a member of the cubscout troop and the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag was led by Mr. George Cruse, Commander of our American Legion, Post #622 Then followed one verse of the song "Star Spangled Banner" with Mrs. Kate Sheridan, President of our Women's Club at the piano. The Invocation Prayer was given by Father Murray of the Episcopal Church, St. Martins-in-the-Field which was followed by a solo from Mrs. Helen Fladwed "The Lord's Prayer" accompanied by Mrs. Sheri dan.

The President's Proclamation setting aside the week of Sept. 17th to 23rd to recognize the founding and terms of our Constitution was read by Mrs. Arthur Fink. Mrs. Flora Boughton acquainted the assemblage with the amendments in the Bill of Rights. Thereafter, Mrs. Lanahan introduced representatives from our organizations, and then turned the meeting over to Mr. Hiestand

who spoke in a very free and easy manner of the rights and freedoms we enjoy under the terms of our Constitution. He recounted them one by one and declared that our Constitution is the greatest docu ment ever drawn and is more effect tive today than at the time it was formulated. Although the name of God is no where mentioned surely and truly the fathers of this instrument were guided by Him in making this nation safe for democracy. It is an instrument that is a stumbling block to the Communists because its terms are not centered in Washington, D.C. but in the individual forty-eight states; therefore, subversive action would have to take place in forty-eight states. Mr. Hiestand encouraged everyone to acquaint themselves with this document and its 22 amendments (ask any librarian for a book on this subject and become better acquainted with the laws of our country and your rights as a citizen).

Dr. Hayward offered the Benediction at the close of the speaker's message, at which time the colors were retarded before the meeting adjourned for the social hour.

A lovely tribute to our country, and Mrs. Lanahan extends her appreciation and thanks to all who came to make it such a memorable occasion.
