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

When he came home he bought a motorcycle to take him back and forth to work and he had only had it a week when a truck took a swipe at it and landed Ed in the hospital with a broken back. He laid there for weeks and was permitted home with a brace, when he was visiting with a friend here and wanted to get the feel of a motorcycle again and had engineered it just a few yard on one of our side streets when a car coming out of a driveway hit him full on.

### PARSONS' PUPILS AT PASADENA

When "The Remarkable Mr. Penny-packer" opens at Pasadena Playhouse on December 1st, six Chatsworth young people will be making their professional bows locally. They are: Richard Allen, Karen Sue Hummel, Dickie Hummel, Lynn McMurrey, Sally Ann Parsons and Susan Pettebone. All of them are former drama students of Milton Parsons, and all of them have distinguished themselves in one or more Cookie Jar Theatre productions.

A lucky chain of circumstances led up to this event. First of all, Mr. Parsons was engaged by Pasadena Playhouse to direct their next production. Secondly, the play in question happened to call for the services of nine children, ranging in age from eight to sixteen years old. The above-named children were right as to type and age. However, in accordance with the policy of Pasadena Playhouse, they had to compete for the parts in a series of open public readings at which more than 150 people tried out. Susan and Sally Ann, in addition to qualifying dramatically, had to demonstrate their competence in ballet technique and be able to dance on their toes in the opening sequence which depicts a ballet lesson.

This is a splendid opportunity for these youngsters, all of whom are, at the present, seriously considering the theatre and its allied arts as a profession. Lynn and Sally Ann have had some previous professional experience, having spent two seasons both acting and working backstage at Windham Playhouse, New England's popular summer

theatre in New Hampshire, where Mr. Parsons has directed for the past three seasons. Gail Pickering, another former student of the Parsons, was also awarded an acting and technical fellowship there last summer, and is now continuing her dramatic studies at the University of Hawaii.
