
Congratulations!

Easter morning breakfast will be served in White Oak Hall on reservation only.

Easter Services at all churches at the regular time, with an additional service at the Comm. Ch. at 8:30 a. m. Holy Communion will

be observed at the Foursquare and Baptist Ch. with the theme of the Resurrection and Life Everlasting at all three churches.

Historical Notes

In 1871 the stagecoach from San Francisco, making one of its runs, came over the ridge of the west mountain and stopped at the station (which is now Oakwood Cemetery) for fresh horses to complete the run into Los Angeles. Then it was that the Hills first beheld the panoramic beauty of this vast valley, and in 1886 left Los Angeles to homestead 110 acres at Devonshire west of Andora. (Today lots in Chatsworth are selling as high as \$5,000).

Minnie Hill, whose American ancestry dates back prior to the Revolutionary War, was born in the fall of 1886, and her first school teacher was Miss Lenora Johnson, sister of Emma Graves and aunt of Kelly and Harold Johnson. In 1903 the Hills gave the So. Pacific RR the rights to build the tunnel on the north crest of their property. In 1909 Minnie married Alfred Palmer and lived in the city, whose marriage was blessed with a son and daughter, both married and living in San Fernando.

Fred Graves of 22000 Chatsworth St. and her brother Lovell Hill owned the General Mercantile Store in front of what is now Rube Ahlstrom's place at 9847 Topanga (that was the town in those days, with the hotel across the street) and they sold everything: farm equipment, seeds, grain, yardage, groceries, no doubt complete with the potbellied stove and cracker barrel; and in 1912 the old homestead house was torn down and the present home built.

In 1920 Minnie and Alfred came back to the old home to care for her mother who remained bedfast for 15 years, so with the exception of 11 years, Minnie has lived all of her life right here.

In the passage of time the store was sold and in 1923 Alfred and Lovell were partners in being the agents for the Trojan Powder Co., trucking dynamite from Oakland to the magazine still located on their property, and from there to sites where the dynamite would be used. In 1926 they acquired the old Bannon homestead (where they changed horses for the stage) of 120 acres, making their total holdings 230 acres. In 1937 the Native Daughters of the Golden West laid down a plaque over the old stage coach trail commemorating its existence.

Alfred passed away in 1946 and Lovell carried on the hauling of dynamite in partnership with their son until Lovell passed away in 1951 when the storage plant was closed down.

In 1955 the property was leased to the Aqua Sierra Sportsman's Club and at the present time details concerning its sale to them are being consummated, with the proviso that Minnie will retain the old home and approx. 2 acres rent and tax-free as long as she lives. The Aqua Sierra have modernized the home in that they have piped the water to the house which up until recently had to be carried in.

Minnie has just returned from a week's plane trip to Hawaii in company with a group from the Farm Bureau in Bakersfield which also included her sister and sister-in-law, but her 15-yr. old cat has told her in no uncertain terms that she is to stop gadding about.

HERE'S AN OLD FAVORITE RECIPE FOR YOU TO TRY...


- 2 pheasants or chukar partridge
- 1 cup long grain rice
- 1 9-oz. pkg. wild rice (optional)
- 1/2 c. finely chopped celery
- 1/4 c. finely chopped gr. pepper
- 1/4 c. finely cut parsley
- 1 small can onion soup

Make broth from neck and giblets of pheasant. Wash and steep wild rice. Steep by covering rice with one inch of boiling water. Drain when cool and repeat three times, adding water from last time to broth. Brown birds in butter over low flame. Remove from pan when brown and add long grain rice to

drippings stirring constantly over low flame until transparent. Remove pan from fire immediately. Add vegetables, seasoning, and broth. Add sufficient onion soup to cover rice. Cover pan and cook over very low flame until rice has absorbed most of the liquid. Add wild rice and mix well. Line covered casserole with rice mixture. Place browned pheasants or partridge on rice.

Cover and roast in 300° over for one hour.
