Our Editorial For The Month

At the Chamber of Commerce meeting April 10, Juvenile Officer Kelly of the Valley Police Dept. gave a lucid report of the existing conditions affecting the true status of court discipline on delinquents. The Valley police are handicapped in the amount of available manpower to cover the 212 square miles here in San Fernando Valley; for example, there is one police officer and one police woman covering the area from Sepulveda west, from the south mountains to the north. The day watch covers the investigators and the night watch the patrol.

The curfew hour is 10:00 p.m., and any teen-agers found loitering after that hour are brought in and parents notified, but no record is made. However, if a child is picked up for a misdemeanor, he is booked as any other criminal and carries that record the rest of his life. "A lot of people don't believe that" said Kelly, "but it is true."

They can be detained at Van Nuys and also in the Detention Hall at Georgia Street but the sad part is that there is no place for them "to be put away for awhile". Putting children in with hardened criminals has been discouraged, yet no other place has been provided - and teen-agers "with records" know that, so that any efforts to make the children straighten up are scorned by the culprits.

Officer Kelly's contention is

that our youth are pampered too much; that the answer to any violation of the law would be a whipping post. There is not enough supervision or checking-up on children in the home, lack of respect, the almost negligible amount of Christian upbringing in 85% of those apprehended, and too much beer-drinking on the part of teen-agers. Where do they get it? You figure it out!

If the penalty were more severe, crime would decrease. The maximum sentence on a dope peddler is 10 years, yet statistics show that even a murderer can get out in seven years on a life-term. Crime is on such an increase that our penal institutions remove those who have served a term out the back door as fresh recruits are brought in the front, in order to make room. One exception: Federal prisons.

More patrolling police would help cut down crime, but the answer is in our laps. What do the children have to do around here? There's no transportation for them to get to Van Nuys and so the easiest breakdown of morals is to steal a car. Another police station is scheduled for Vanowen and Vanalden in the near future which will help shorten the distance of their vigilance.

Many conscientious citizens of Chatsworth, topped by such leaders as George Cruse of the American

Legion, Hank Crowley of Rotary, Chas. Janess of the Chamber of Commerce, and Russ McElvain of the Chatsworth Market and their supporters have been greatly concerned with the lack of facilities here for our youth, but they can't do it alone. We can't rely on any other community to furnish activities for our children, such as Orcutt Park with their proposed swimming pool. In the first place, transportation, and in the second place, it will soon be so crowded with children from all around, that it'll be another Reseda pool where standing room only is available. The time has come and is upon us **WHERE WE MUST HELP OUR YOUTH**. We can't let them run their own lives and let them pick up whatever amusement comes to hand; we must know where they are, and if we had a Recreation Center here in Chatsworth which would give them baseball, volleyball, basketball, bowling alleys (indoor and outdoor sports--yes, even including a swimming pool), we would **KNOW** where our children are. Does anyone have enough fortitude to call together a townhall meeting so that everyone may have a chance to discuss this possibility?

First of all, we would need a large parcel of ground, and then the funds to erect a sufficient building with the facilities mentioned. Sure, it'll cost money and plenty, but to take care of our own, it'll be worth it. Maybe we as citizens of this fair city could float a bond or something, but let's float something. Let us make sure that our children are mentally and physically active **HERE** in fellowship with friends whom we know.

If anybody has anything to say, say it!!

Wonderful attendance and sunny weather made a perfect day!

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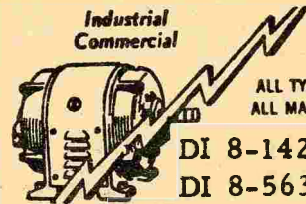
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Auxiliary Meeting
