ROCKETDYNE

Chatsworth was honored at a luncheon given at the San Fernando Country Club in Woodland Hills by Rocketdyne of North American Aviation for the express purpose of enlightening those who attended with the extent and function of their vast operations. Those who met with several of the executives from North American were: Mdms. Jean Saal, Kate Sheridan, Viola Haskell, Mssrs. Griff McKeeby. Al Brain, J. Dean Park, Chas. Janess, Ben Boydston, and Robert Boggis.

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Rocketdyne, we learned, is one of the seven divisions of North American, with its main office at Canoga Park, with branches in Downey and other states, covering a personnel in this one division of 8,500, with 7,000 in this area, of which 2,500 are up on the Hill.

Mr. Dave Juenke, Director of Public Relations mc'd the discussion period following the luncheon and introduced Mr. S. K. Hoffman, General Manager of Rocketdyne, who gave the group a general view of their immense operations, specializing in the design, development and production of large liquid rocket engines. Their testing facilities on the hill are expanding

rapidly; they are concerned and are making every effort to minimize the noise of their operations, with sites for large-scale production elsewhere. The building in construction now across from the main office on Canoga Avenue will be their material and purchasing plant.

Mr. Ladd, assistant to the Gen.Mgr. of Atomics International, explained the experimental work going on in this sub-division, pointing out that they are engaged solely in peacetime application of nuclear physics and power development (the only such non-military plant in the world) for medical, industrial and scientific pursuits of purpose; whose talk was supplemented by Dr. Farris explaining the use of uranium as fuel in their present SRE operation (sodium reactor experiment). Our resources of coal and gas are gradually being depleted and these experiments are taking place now to fill the need for electricity in the years to come, at which time its cost will be comparable to our rates today. experiments are going on now in Idaho. The development of their findings have been put into use by many concerns throughout our country as well as Japan and Denmark. Atomics International will soon occupy a new building in Van Nuys, presently utilizing the services of 1,450 people.

Mr. Cecka, Chief of Engineering Tests on the hill, explained the operations of the turbojet and ramjet engines powered by oxygen which limits their ultimate capacity to 90,000' in the air; the solid rocket and pressurized liquid rocket engines. The pump-fed liquid rocket is the one being fired now. The overall operations of Rocketdyne is the building of power for outer space.

In the questions and answers which followed, the problem of heavy traffic on Plummer Street was discussed between the President of our Chamber, Chas. Janess, and Mr. Thompson of their Traffic Department, who explained that aerial surveys have been made and every effort is being made for additional arteries of traffic. Guard stations have been increased to direct its flow.

Mr. Clark of the Fire Prevention Department was justly proud of their record in fire prevention, with a personnel of 50 people, with trained auxiliaries available.
