
Southern California Gas Co. and their Evening Concert Series presented nightly except Sunday over KFAC from 8 to 10 p.m.

Beethoven's fondness for Viennese noble-women - Berlios' emotional relations to other people -Liszt with his 88 children, being very exceptional considering the fact he was never married, and also that he established his genius before he stopped playing for the public at the age of 37 - extravagant Wagner who always wore silk all these combined with other little facts, made for a thoroughly enjoyable talk, uniquely presented by Mr. Baird.

He also mentioned some of our newer musical artists - how Kirsten Flagstad, who is in her middle 60s, likes to sing with Lawrence Melchior because of his relaxed approach and how Grace Moore was very temperamental.

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

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

Mrs. Ray Moon, Chatsworth PTA Community Chest Chairman, will present her program of the drive which begins November 8.


