THE COST OF MEDICINALS

Relatively expensive prescriptions tend to be for antibiotics, hormones, and newer drugs that cure or arrest disease in ways impossible a decade or so ago. Its human to remember the cost of a drug that may have prevented a serious illness before it really got started, or even an operation that never happened It might surprise you to know that 62% of all prescriptions cost \$2 or Less. In 1954, the average cost of a prescription was \$2 27. The expensive ones, costing \$5 or more, amounted to LESS than 7% of all prescriptions filled. It costs the average pharmacy from 75¢ to \$1 just to fill the simplest prescription, quite apart from cost of ingredients. Many of our most important drugs, such as antibiotics, can't be put together by the pharmacist from simple ingredients. Their production requires complex equipment and intricate controls for Processing raw materials through numerous critical stages of manufacture Averaged out, we citizens spend about \$6.50 per year for a little more than 2 1/2 prescriptions



7. Thou shalt not permit the television to crowd out family conversation and counselling, but use it for the mutual benefit of all its members.


8. Thou shalt use its dramatic advertisements as opportunities to teach children what is wrong with the wrong and right with the right.


