The following article appeared in the Dec. 22 issue of the Van Nuys News and Green Sheet, and was mailed to the Grapevine office. article is reproduced here as we feel it is of interest to Chatsworth residents. Please note that the Grapevine does not acknowledge or print anonymous letters for obvious reasons -please sign your letters with news or suggestions and they will be duly recognized.

A group of Chatsworth citizens today are reported to be seeking legal counsel over alleged illegality of the Chamber of Commerce election.

Ben Boydston, incumbent, was elected to the presidency for a second term by a margin of two votes.

Two issues divide the membership and involve interpretation of the chamber's bylaws.

Law Limits Service

It was reported that if interpretation of the by-laws is to the effect that the officers (president, vice presidents. treasurer and secretary) are members of the board of directors, then the incumbent president, having served three years on the board, and again as president, is an illegal candidate.

The bylaws state that a member of the board of directors can serve only three consecutive years.

It also was reported that at a meeting of the directors Monday night reference was made to the bylaws, which provide that a person or firm

holding one or more memberships, shall have the right ... to change its representatives upon written notice to the chamber, if approved by the

However, it was stated that several votes were accepted during the election when the bearers had no letter designating them as official.

These two issues were reported to constitute the basis of the protests over legality of

the election.

A motion was made and seconded that the process be declared "no election" and new nominations be made and a new election held.

May Delay Installation Before a vote could be taken, another motion was was made and seconded that the previous motion be tabled until legal advice could be sought. The tabling motion carried 142, 12-2

A motion then was made and seconded that plans progress for the January installation unless the opposition to the present members of the board be challenged by legal action.



The Board of Public Works has recommended to City Council the start of condemnation proceedings against a proposed fire station site on the east side of Topanga Canyon Blvd. about 450 feet south of Marilla Street. The site is 100 x 70 feet.

The need for a station in this area long has been stressed by District Councilman Pat McGee, and concurred in by the Fire Department.

A. M. Hill, director of the Bureau of Right of Way and Land, informed Councilman McGee that he considers this site the best available in the community it is to serve, that he has made an appraisal of its worth but that the Bureau was unable to acquire it by negotiations.

Funds for its purchase are available in the 1955 Fire Station bond issue approved by the voters.

Pending the filing of condemnation proceedings, negotiations will be continued with the owner.
