

The nation's first "service Center" for ballistic millile rocket engines is under construction at DeSoto and Nordhoff by Rocketdyne, a division of North American Aviation, Inc. Construction of the 132,000 square-foot building will provide office and factory space to support future field units of Atlas, Thor and Jupiter missiles, whose engines are built by

Rocketdyne. The new building, being constructed by Lindgren and Swinerton, Inc., of Los Angeles, is expected to be ready for occupancy by this fall. It is being built by private funds at a cost of \$1,500,000 and will be headquarters for some 1,000 service personnel, and will be headed by J. A. Broadston.
