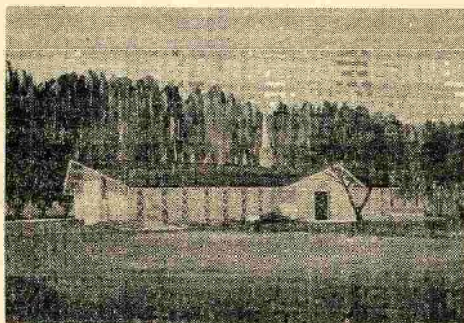
## Turkey Dinner & Bazaar

# Egremont School

WHERE CHILDREN LEARN BECAUSE THEY ARE HAPPY

Report cards at Egremont Chatsworth and Egremont Encino grade each child as an individual according to his ability. This process is known as a "progress report" and has proved so successful, it should be incorporated in every educational institution. This report informs every parent or guardian of his child's progress as an individual in school activities of all phases: academic, social, personal, and physical.

Egremont's progress report is directed to the parent with the following message inscribed on the cover: "This report is to acquaint you with the progress of your child toward two major purposes: first, that your child shall become a desirable citizen of our democracy, and second, that he shall meet reasonable expectations of achievement. You are welcome to visit the school at any time. If you wish more complete information, we suggest you make an appointment for a conference with the teacher or principal". This message introduces each Egremont parent to his child's teacher and establishes a parent-teacher relationship that is a necessity to improve a child's education.

Each level of teaching at Egremont has its own progress report. There is one for pre-school, nursery level; a special report for pre-primer, a special type for 1st grade, a different one for 2nd through 6th grades, and one geared for 7th, 8th, and 9th grades, the secondary level of education.

The pre-school nursery group progress report used at Egremont Chatsworth contains the following information: taking part in group activities, getting along with others, observing rules, showing self-control, considering rights of others, appreciating contributions of others, and showing wholesome interest in play. These are all important in social development. The next step is basic work habits, which includes following directions, showing effort, working carefully, and speech development. Also at this level are health habits; observing safety rules, observing eating and sleeping habits, personal habits, and muscular coordination.

The Kindergarten and pre-primer child advances a level and his progress report includes the preceding paragraph plus the following: music, rhythms, manuscript printing, art and handwork, speech, and reading readiness. On each nursery, kindergarten, and pre-primer progress report, two important questions are asked, "Is your child happy in school?" and "Does he show interest in his work?"

When a child enters Egremont Encino at the 1st grade level, his progress report will be geared one of two ways. If he hasn't had pre-school training it will include many of the things mentioned previously, plus the following which will also appear on the regular report of the child with pre-school training: language, writing, number

concepts, social studies, reading through phonics, music, art, speech, and foreign language. The social habits, work habits, and health habits remain the same. Included in this report, is a space for a special comment by the teacher.

The progress report for 2nd through 6th grades remains the same, at each grade level of learning. Grading is now done in actual subject material - reading, both oral and silent; language, oral and written expression; writing, science, and spelling, weekly assignment and written work; arithmetic, basic processes and problem solving, social studies, music, art, physical education, and foreign language. The social, personal, and health habits progress with the child through each grade.

After completing 6th grade, the child enters the secondary level of education. The working system changes to the A, B, C, D, and F, system. The subjects are: reading, oral and silent; language, oral and written expression, writing, science, spelling, weekly assignment and written work, mathematics, basic processes and problem solving; social studies, music, art, physical education, and foreign language. Each child is graded on work habits and cooperation in every subject; E for excellent, S for satisfactory, and U for unsatisfactory. Social habits are graded on the child's ability to get along with others, observing rules, dependability, courtesy, and sportsmanship. Work habits include following directions, effort shown, working carefully, thrifty use of time and materials. Health habits include safety rules, and manners. This

progress report should be presented four times a year and each time a special comment should be made by the teacher and a space allowed for parental comment. This form of grading has resulted in a higher measure of understanding between the parent and teacher, a working togetherness between the home and the school.

Mrs. Marion H. Burbridge, Director of the three Egremont Schools, has made the following comment: "A progress report rather than a graded report card is in accord with our democratic principles. It recognizes that each child is an individual, that his personality, ability to learn and grasp, and talents are unique unto him. His marks are based on what is reasonable to expect from him at his own level of maturity. Reports should be understood by the child's parents to be the level reached each June as the starting point of his schoolwork the following September. Progress reports show two distinct phases of growth and development-- the academic on one side, and the personal habits and attitudes on the other. A good fair sound educational system detaches discipline from achievement to a degree. A child's grade must not as a matter of course be lowered because of misconduct. But if he misbehaves to the extent that he falls back in his work habits, then of course it should be lowered. Some of our most brilliant students are some of the greatest discipline problems. By the same token, there is the shy, retired child who may reflect this in his grades. Your child's teacher is the judge of your child's ability (please turn to page 4)

ties and accomplishments. This teacher is trained and schooled to cope with every type of individual. You parents must learn to know and work with this teacher. You must trust his judgment and respect and follow through with his recommendations. Parent-teacher conferences are most important. He can inform you of your child's difficulties and you can help the teacher to help your child overcome them. He can discuss with you your child's present achievements and recommend and forecast for his future. With this added insight of your child, you can help him grow and develop the very best of his own individual ability, which will enable him to take his place in society as a good, educated, healthy United States citizen." Thus Mrs. Burbridge's ideals of a progress report have attained the highest goal of every school; Egremont, today, is tops scholastically in the state of California and in contention throughout the U.S.A.

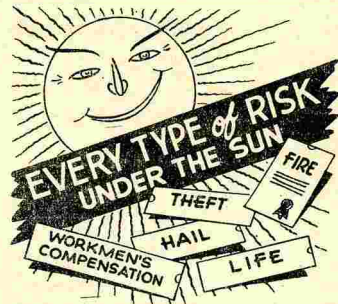
SENIOR SYMPOSIUM will be the theme of the Canoga Park High School PTA Meeting to be
