Three narcotic addicts were apprehended at the corner of Hilliew and Devonshire last Thursday afternoon, after they had stolen shirts from J. C. Penney store in Canoga Park. Officer D. Lloyd stopped the men after their license number had been broadcast throughout the West Valley, and within a few minutes three other police cars arrived on the scene to assist him in handcuffing the men and in searching the car. No evidence of narcotics was found in the car, according to Sgt. O. Deryk of the West Valley Police Division. The three men were from Pacoima: Alfred T. Perez, 26, who went to court Tuesday afternoon (Sgt. Deryk's opinion was that he probably would be sent to San Quentin); Ray S. Solis, 20, who is at present serving 90 days in the county jail; and Arnold O. Ortiz, 23, who was released on lack of evidence -he claimed he took the other men shopping and had no knowledge they planned to steal. Sgt. Deryk has asked the Grape-

vine to stress to its readers the importance of reporting to the police strangers at the door -especially if someone asks foolish directions or asks for yard work. The course of action taken is this: after the men knock at the door, if someone answers they make up a quick story or request -- if no one answers they quickly go to the rear of the house and either steal tools or other valuables from an open garage, or go through a window and steal whatever is easiest to move in a hurry. Most popular items are TV sets, vacuum cleaners, and small appliances. It is suggested you write down the serial numbers of such items and keep in a safe place.

If such a stranger comes to your door, GET THE LICENSE NUMBER of their car and immediately call DI 4-0151, Sgt. O. Deryk or Sgt. L. Selby. This is a direct line to their office and they are most anxious to maintain a closer touch with our area!

Barry Lee Krems, 21, who admittedly stole \$500 worth of equipment from the SOUND SHOP on August 31, is also in custody and the stolen property has been returned.


also be made from the floor. A speaker from the Dept. of Recreation & Parks will bring inormation about our new park.

Hallowe'en decor, costuming, appropriate games and stunts, music and singing brought fun and pleasure to each group's activities.


