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

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
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in the southern half of Calif. declined for the 3rd straight month during October, Security First National Bank's Monthly Summary of Business Conditions reported today. The steel strike, a general tightness of credit and the continued drop in building and real estate activity were factors retarding last month's business activity, according to David A. Lathein, manager of the local branch. Security's business

index for October was 4.9 per cent below July's record peak, but was 7.7 per cent above the same month last year. On a seasornally adjusted basis, unemployment increased for the second consecutive month. And, employment in the southern half of the state declined slightly in October, although a moderate increase is the usual pattern for that month. However, employment reached an all-time high in September despite the steel strike, and the decline last month still left total employment above 4.2 per cent above a year earlier.

Preliminary figures from the Department of Commerce's just-released nationwide Census of Retail Trade reveal that retail sales for 1958 in the Los-Angeles-Orange County area totaled \$8,881,629,000 -- up 25 per cent from the 1954 total.

Atty. DAVID EARLE FULWIDER, 82, affectionately known to lawyers and civic leaders throughout Los Angeles as "Judge", completed his last civic service Monday, November 16, when he attended a Boy Scout District board meeting. He worked in his law office on Tuesday, and on Thursday was stricken with a heart ailment. He died Friday in the Valley Hospital. Memorial services were held Monday night, November 23, at the Lorenzen Mortuary in Reseda, with private graveside rites the following morning.

Born May 7, 1877, on a farm in Bareholomew County, Indiana, Mr. Fulwider's college education at De Pauw University was interrupted by advice of his physician that sent him to Denver for cure of a tubercular condition. While recovering his health, he studied to be an Episcopal clergyman but later changed his mind. Later he studied law in the office of Judge Olin Wellbom in Santa Analand.

was admitted to the bar, standing 2nd in the list of candidates. His law work was conducted for 33 yrs. in the office he had at the time of his death in the Guaranty Bldg. on Hollywood Blvd.

In 1933 he bought the 3-acre hilltop site in Andora Avenue where he has lived since that time

"Judge" Fulwider frequently laughingly replied when called "Judge", "The only time I ever judged anything was at a county fair". But Chatsworth friends always addressed him in this way. The years spent here were given in unstinted service to the community through the Chamber of Commerce and other community services.

He leaves his widow, Leicester, who became his 3rd wife in 1935; a son, Robert, by his 1st marriage, a prominent So. Calif. attorney; a daughter by his 2nd marriage, Mrs. Max Pillard of Honolulu; and a host of friends both here &throughout the L. A. area.

"...The white race has taken advantage of the "Dolce Far Nieute" beauty of the native life, and neglected the discipline and tabus which kept it clean and wholesome, and they do not set a very admirable example for these brownedskinned children of the tropics.

"Two days in Tahiti and we were off again for more festivities and lovely sailing weather. After 5 more days at sea we reached the shores of wonderful New Zealand where the English have established their ways and customs. Here again the Mormons brought us their native dances and music. The islanders here are taking their places in government and business. Here also we found our second spring, with all our own flowers, and many strange ones all in bloom, for, as you know, the seasons are reversed here.

"Then, on to Australia, which I had always imagined was right next door to New Zealand. But it took three days of steady 23-25 knots an hour to reach the harbor of Sydney. Here Scott and I were surprised with interviews from newspapers, radio, and TV, as the folks "down under" are simply fanatical about movies and anyone connected with them. Several articles appeared in the papers the next day and we "hammed it up" on TV for our shipmates and for the local residents. The people here, incidentally, are very nice and LIKE the U.S. Which is more than I can say for Europeans, as a rule.

"For three days we enjoyed Sydney and its environs, the zoo and countryside. He ading back, we again put in at Auckland where the ship restocked supplies, meat and dairy products. Then we took off for the Fiji Islands. Suva, the principal city, is a fascinating place.

English influence is fast civilizing and educating these handsome people, who still wear very picturesque dress and ornaments. One day only, we spent here, then headed north for Pago Pago in Samoa. This is a gorgeous harbor and a very strategic one in our own U.S. defense program. Here we bought baskets, mats, and fans, until there was hardly room on the ship to store it all!

"Five more long, happy days, brought us to heavenly Hawaii where we began to feel at home again -- so lush and green and tropical, but clean by our standards, and we weren't afraid to eat their excellent food.

"Another five days brought us safely into the Golden Gate and then HOME, where the ground has finally stopped heaving and rolling and we don't have to brace ourselves for the next wave! It was, in all, a happy, restful, and interesting vacation tour."
