Gray family, pioneer residents of Chatsworth. Mrs. Burns recalled that she was the first piano pupil Mrs. Johnson had when she came to Chatsworth as a bride in 1920.

The Grays came here in about 1890, and Mr. Gray was an extensive land owner here for many years. At one time he owned all of the land north of Lassen, west to the hills, and east to Brown's Canyon, with the exception of one parcel, which he purchased at \$12.50 an acre!! The presented the property to the Methodist Church, where the present building was erected in 1903.







FATHER ANTHONY STUBBEN, Redemptorist Priest, arrived from Manaos, Brazil, on January 26 to visit his relatives, one of which is Dick Ivan of the Grapevine staff.

After travelling 1,000 miles from the upper headwaters of the Amazon River he was flown to New York City and arrived in Los Angeles via the Greyhound Scenic Cruiser. Father Anthony in two months travelled 4,000 miles on a wellearned vacation after 11 years in the Brazilian jungles.

His birthplace is in San Antonio, Texas, and he received Seminary training at Oconomowac, Wisconsin. He was chosen for missionary work by the Church and was sent to South America in 1949. He has survived dysentery, poisonous snakes, jungle fever and privations of bad shelter and food. In the years that followed, the strength of his vocation made possible the adjustment to his environment.

Upon arrival in Southern California Father Anthony was dazzled by the splendor of the countryside, by the transportation facilities; by the housing and living conditions in general which we enjoy daily.

He visited Disneyland and Hollywood - he viewed the California landscape - the ocean the mountains - the desert - the rivers. He talked with the people and gave quiet thanks for all he had seen.

Father Anthony will return to the Amazon territory in two months to resume his mission there.

Mr. and Mrs. ARNOLD SPOTTS were happily surprised recently by a visit from Mrs. Spotts' sister and husband, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Vickers of Hartville, Ohio. Mrs. Spotts, who had not seen her sister for fourteen years, had never met her husband nor seen their three children. The trip was an unexpected one for the Vickers who had the opportunity to drive a car here for a friend. They returned home last week after a two-week stay.
