The NORTHBRIDGE-CHATSWORTH 4-H CLUB met on Saturday, February 27 at White Oak Hall, when they heard an informative talk by Mr. and Mrs. Michael Neushul of Palos Verdes Medical Research Foundation, on immune milk.

At one time Neushul's son, Pete, was an active 4-H member having goats as a project. With the beginning of college he dropped 4-H and Neushuls decided to donate these animals to the foundation. Immune milk is being used for the treatment of snake venom, cancer, rheumatoid arthritis, staph infection, bacterial viruses, allergies, including poison oak, and diseases in both man and animal.

Neushuls told of the miraculous results of this milk in this research program. Heading this project is Dr. Berry Campbell, research professor of neurosurgery at the College of Medical Evangelists. An excellent article concerning the subject of immune milk has appeared in the February issue of Coronet magazine.

Any medical businessmen interested in obtaining further information feel free to contact Dr. Philip Vogel, professor and chairman of neurosurgery at the College of Medical Evangelists.
