
If everyone registers who is eligible, the San Fernando Valley could have as many as five councilmen in City Hall representing us! Do your part!



The NORTHRIDGE-CHATSWORTH 4-H CIDB met on Saturday, February 27 at White Oak Hall, when they heard an informative talk by Mr. and Mrs. Michael Neushal of Palos Verdes Medical Research Foundation, on immune milk.

At one time Neushul's son, Pete, was an active 4-H member having goats as a project. With the beginning of college he dropped 4-H and Neushuls decided to donate these animals to the foundation. Immune milk is being used for the treatment of snake venum, cancer, rheumatoid arthritis, staph infection, bacterial viruses, allergies, including poison oak, and diseases in both man and animal.

Neushuls told of the miraculous results of this milk in this research program. Heading this project is Dr. Berry Campbell, research professor of neurosurgery at the College of Medical Evangelists. An excellent article conserning the subject of immune milk has appeared in the February issue of Coronet magazine.




