YOUTH BANDITS

Chatsworth came into some unfavorable publicity the past week when two local youngsters, a boy 10 and a girl 12, were taken into custody by police officers Robert Cole and L. J. Brown, when they were found in a Reseda hardware store after closing hours, with the intent to rob the store.

Names of the children are withheld in accordance with police policy.

They were discovered by two store employees and offered to leave if they could keep the guns, when police officers, previously notified by one of the employees, arrived. The boy threatened them all at gun point, but when the officers put aside their guns and went into the room where they were, they persuaded the pair to give up.

Juvenile officers said petitions were to be filed in juvenile court for disposition of the pair, who have proof records of burglary and run-away.



the nearly one million Americans who were wounded, in both World Wars and the Korean conflict.

Memorial poppies, which are made by disabled veterans from this country's past three wars, will be worn both as a memorial to our war dead and as a tribute to the disabled. The red paper poppies supplied in this locality were made at the San Fernando Veterans Hospital at San Fernando.

Volunteer workers from the Auxiliary have donated their time in order to hold the annual program.
