Present were: The president of the largest independent steel company; the president of the largest utility Company; the greatest wheat speculator; the president of the New York Stock Exchange; a member of the President's Cabinet; the greatest "bear" in Wall Street; the president of the Bank of International Settlements; the head of the world's greatest monopoly.

These men controlled more wealth than is in the United States Treasury. Newspapers and magazines printed their success stories and urged the youth of the nation to follow their examples.

Yet 25 years later, this is what had happened to them: The president of the largest independent steel company - Charles Schwablived on borrowed money for five years before he died bankrupt. The greatest wheat speculator - Arthur Cutten - dies abroad insolvent. The president of the New York Stock Exchange - Richard Whitney - was sentenced to Sing Sing prison for larceny. The member of the President's Cabinet - Albert Fall - was pardoned from prison so he could die at home. The greatest "bear" in Wall Street - Jesse Livermore - died a suicide. The head of the greatest monopoly - Ivar Kruegar - died a suicide.
