THE FLOOD AT THREE RIVERS

excerpt from letter received from Jack Garrity, Past Commander of American Legion here.

" Here in Three Rivers we were badly hit by the rampaging waters of the Kaweah River, which came out of Sequoia National Park in four forks, three of them meeting at our little village. We lost all of our big bridges and were isolated for three days with no power, no heat, and no water. The phones were out for eight days.

" Three Rivers lost a total of two motels and one trailer camp, completely wiped out - no trace left of them. A total of 15 homes were completely demolished. Cattle and other livestock disappeared. Fortunately no lives were lost in our area, which was a miracle, so fast did the waters descend on us.

" As for us personally, we lost little compared to many others. Our losses amounted to one new well, pipe, motor and pump; three quarters of a mile of fencing; and approx. 500 trees. However, our cabins and main buildings were on high ground and were not touched. Five of our horses were marooned on an island in the middle of the river for five days, but they are safe and sound now. Several stores in the village were completely wiped out but we are all working together and going along as best we can. We opened our Ranch to all victims, offering lodging and food without charge. The state and county still maintain a guarded road-block to prevent all traffic from entering our area until road crews repair the road and bridge damage. It

was indeed an experience, but we thank our Father that we were so fortunate.

" I would like to add my thanks to all those who did all the work to make the children's Christmas party such a happy and huge success."

uld break away from the glacier, the noise thereof sounded as cannons. From there back to Wellington and before arriving at Rotorua, they stayed at the Chateau Hotel which "nestles" at the foot of three volcanos, one of which erupted a year or two ago and was still smoldering.

On to Rotorua, N.Z., and among their activities, visited the Mauri (Polynesian) native village. Natural steam emanates from the ground and thereon the natives perform their cooking tasks, washing, etc., all out of the natural ground. Their guide was Rane, a Maori girl educated in the Episcopal Mission in England, and had among many celebrities, escorted the Queen of England and the Duke on their tour. They witnessed the activities, etc. and attended a Mauri concert and both of our travelers commented upon the exquisite quality of their voices. New Zealand is very green, clear up to the top of the mountains where sheep graze.

Back to Auckland via a narrow gauge railroad that bridged a chasm which, a year or two ago, had washed completely away and caused considerable loss of life when the train failed to be forewarned. The Boggis' crossed this chasm unaware of this occurrence until the next morning, but the mind can concoct many imaginations of what could have been.

They crossed the rough Tasman Sea to Sidney, Australia (3½ days) arriving at the most beautiful land-locked harbor in the world,

The Boggis' arrived in the spring of the year (south of the equator) and the countryside abounded in spring flowers. The majority of the hotels are unheated so any warmth is acquired by the use of the hot water bottle. When chunks

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making the Hotel Australia their headquarters for one month. Mr. Boggis attended Rotary Club meetings throughout their tour and while at Sidney met International Rotary President Baker from Cleveland, Ohio.

They planed to Hayman Island and spent a week there, viewing the Barrier coral reefs, and where, outside their hotel rooms, screaming cockatoos were their constant companions.

Three days at Blue Mountains, site of the Jenolan Caves. They explored one cave called the Glow-worm Cave; they entered a room and got into a boat underground, and a few minutes later all of the lights were turned off and on the ceiling were literally millions of glow-worms about 2" long, with a constant glow. Their silvery webs hung down and thereon they captured their food.

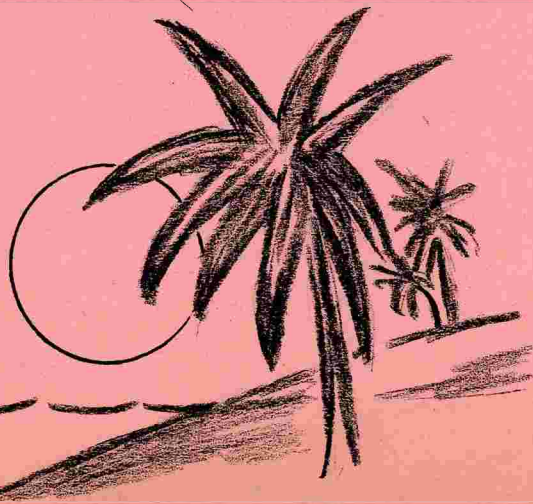
At Sidney, they planed 300 miles and were guests on a 55,000 acre sheep ranch, employing about 100 jackeroos (cowboys) where they were privileged to witness the operations covering 35,000 sheep and 2,000 cattle, raising the finest rams in the world. While there the group shot one fox, three goannas (lizards about 6 feet long) and spotted 22 wild kangaroos whose speed in flight is phenomenal.

Australia abounds in eucalyptus trees; is about the size of our United States and the total population about 9 million. Sidney commands 2 million and is very modern, yet the interior is sparsely settled.

They embarked on the "SS Aron-say" for the 12-day voyage to Honolulu where they stayed for one month at the Halekilani Hotel at Waikiki Beach and used the airways to take them to various islands. There they took in the coffee, pineapple and sugar-cane plantations, and like all of our other travelers to Honolulu from here, were astounded and amazed at the profusion, colorful and stupendous size of its local flowers.

They returned to the states via the Lurline, leaving Honolulu on Thursday, enjoying the added festivities of New Year's Eve on board ship and arrived in Wilmington January 4th, thus completing a four-months' tour.

The written word cannot do justice to the memories they have of this wonderful, wonderful trip, but to us who are still at home, it has given us a keen insight into some of the wonders that were your privilege to enjoy. Thanks so much, Mr. and Mrs. Boggis, for this very fine report.



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
